Dear Friend,

"Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you."

The gospel this week goes against our hardwired protective self-protective instincts to love enemies and to do good to those who wish us ill.

Expending energy and time on people who don't care – or people that don't even like us seems like a waste of time. Are we supposed to love when it doesn't matter? Jesus's command to "love one another" might not mean that we empty ourselves to exhaustion. It does mean that when we do pour ourselves out – whether we receive payment back or not – we can have confidence that we have acted in love and acted in Christ. We don't have to keep doing impossible tasks that do not fulfill us. But our love – even unnoticed – is not worthless. Our love is precious in God's eyes – and we are too.

Jesus does not promise that we will not be taken advantage of in this world. He calls us not to self-preservation but to live with the radical love and generosity that he will model when he washes his disciples' feet and ultimately lays down his life for us.
