Spring Sees New Life Blooming at St. Ann's

Anxiety, isolation, sadness, loss...we've packed so many emotions into a single year. Yet we've also witnessed strength, courage, generosity, and perseverance beyond measure. And with the arrival of spring and the availability of the COVID-19 vaccine, hope is in the air.

I am very pleased to note that all elders and staff of St. Ann's Community have been offered the vaccine. We also encourage visitors to get it when eligible. Our medical team concurs with the national experts: the vaccine is crucial to ending the pandemic.

While visits were on hold due to the pandemic, life at St. Ann's was definitely not. Our resilient elders and exceptional employees made sure of that. Staff from every department went above and beyond, finding creative ways to keep our elders safe, engaged, and well cared for despite the restrictions. I cannot say enough about that level of commitment or how proud I am of our employees.

Work also continued on our historic renovation project at St. Ann's Home. Floors 7 and 8 were completely renovated and re-opened in 2020. Sixty elders are now enjoying the beautiful new Mendon, Cobbs Hill, Browncroft, and Upper Falls households on those floors. Next up is floor 6, which is on schedule to open to elders in April. And the project continues.

These amazing renovations are supported by the *For All They've Given* Campaign, which as of December 31, 2020, had raised \$11.7M. Thank you to all our philanthropic donors for their generous support, allowing us to thank our elders for all they've given our community and our country over the course of their lives.

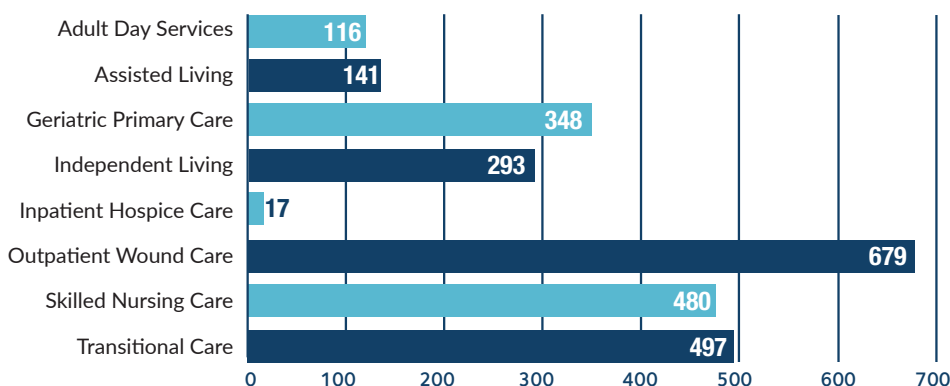

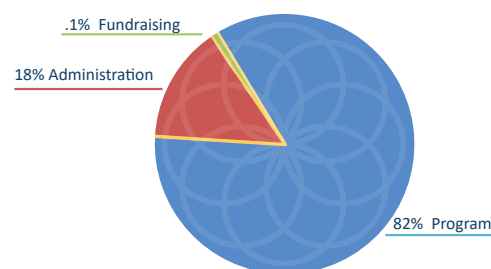

Cherry Ridge Resident Honored for Lifetime Service in Ham Radio

His name is Irv Goodman, but he's an Elmer.

In the lingo of amateur (ham) radio operators, "Elmer" is an esteemed term for an experienced operator who provides personal guidance to those new to the field of amateur radio.

That's Irv Goodman, a resident of Cherry Ridge and an avid ham radio enthusiast. Known to his colleagues as AF2K, Irv was recently presented with a Lifetime Achievement Award by the Rochester DX Association, a club dedicated to amateur radio.

"People all over know AF2K," says Tom Enedy (KD2SJN), a maintenance mechanic at Cherry Ridge and a fellow ham who helped Irv set up his radio when he first moved in. "He's been a fixture on the local scene for over 50 years."

Now in his 80s, Irv has been the go-to guy for generations of young ham radio operators.

"It honestly was his life," says Max Kelley (KC2SPY), whose first radio

was a loaner from Irv. "He retired early from Burroughs Corporation and helping others in ham radio became his life."

In addition to being a mentor to young hams, Irv held leadership positions with the Rochester DX Association, the Rochester Amateur Radio Association, and the Rochester VHF Group. The clubs provide opportunities for ham operators to ply their craft both for fun and in service to the community. (For example, in natural disasters amateur radio is often used for emergency communication when conventional means fail.)

Irv was supposed to receive his award at a banquet in 2020 but COVID-19 changed that plan. Ever resourceful, his fellow hams found a unique way to honor their Elmer: as Irv watched from his window, a parade of 32 cars with more than 50 hams aboard drove past, honking, waving, and of course sending their congratulation to him over their radios.

Although Irv isn't on the air much these days, the tribute proved inspiring.




"It triggered something in him," says Max. "He got behind the microphone and just fell right in like the old days. It was an honor communicating with him again over the radio."

The Lifetime Achievement Award is now on display in Irv's apartment alongside congratulatory cards from radio enthusiasts from all over the world who are proud to call him a friend. "It felt odd," Irv says of receiving the award, "but it looks good in my apartment. I'm gonna keep it."

Leo Center for Caring: Daughter Recalls Mom's Experience

Music was always important to Mary Morphet.

"My mother would sing all the time, to the point where you didn't want to hear it anymore," says her daughter Linda with a laugh. "Music had a huge impact in her life. It made her happy."

Mary was at the *Leo Center for Caring* at St. Ann's Community as she approached the end of her life. She remained active and clear-minded until her last few days, when she stopped eating and didn't open her eyes. Then came the song.

"A young woman from St. Ann's Pastoral Care team came into the room and asked if I'd like her to sing *Ave Maria*, which everyone knew was my mother's favorite," says Linda. "I said 'Absolutely'. She sang it—in Italian no less—and my mother opened her eyes and smiled. It brought her

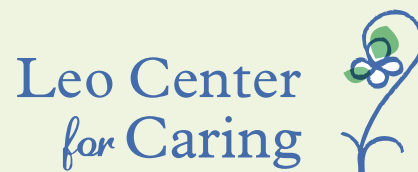
back, briefly, from where she had been. It was an amazing moment, and it brought me a lot of peace."

It was also indicative of the personal attention and care Mary received at the Leo Center.

"The fact that they knew it was her favorite song and they sent someone to sing it speaks volumes," Linda says. "We held her funeral in The *Walter and Barbara Parkes Family Chapel* at St. Ann's and the staff could talk about her because they really knew her. They were wonderful, not just to us but to everyone."

A reprise of *Ave Maria* was also performed at Mary's funeral.

During her stay at the Leo Center, Mary stayed as active as she could. She enjoyed visiting the Friendship Garden Pond behind St. Ann's Home, picking tomatoes from the community garden, and joining in on activities held elsewhere at St. Ann's. That included bingo, happy hour, Mass in the *Parkes Family Chapel*, and concerts in the lobby, which staff would take Mary to if her family wasn't able.



"As a daughter, it gave me a lot of peace of mind," Linda says. "They really took care of her. And when my mother was still doing well, it was a lively place. It didn't feel like 'hospice'."

She notes that Mary's friends—"these 80 and 90 year old Italian women"—would come and play cards with her in the Leo Center. "It felt like home. She continued enjoying life right until the end, and the Leo Center made that possible."

Annie's Kitchens: Heavenly Support from St. Ann's Angels

It never hurts to have an angel, or a few, on your side.

"The Annie's Angel Fund helps those who can't afford things others are able to, like going to the hair salon, going to a baseball game, or enjoying lunch out," says Sue Whalen, who co-chairs St. Ann's Angels with Dolly Cerame.

"If it helps them enjoy life a little more, we are here to support it," adds Dolly.

Annie's Angels raise funds in various ways. Over the years its four "choirs" (subgroups of volunteers) have held wine tastings and presented cooking demonstrations which over time morphed into St. Ann's signature event, FOOD FIGHT. They sponsor the can and bottle recycling program at St. Ann's. The Annie's Angel fund also receives charitable gifts from donors who choose to support them with a charitable contribution, including many gifts in memory of elders who have lived at St. Ann's.

And their financial support helps in ways large and small. The prizes that elders win during Bingo? Annie's Angels provides them. The presents every elder receives

at Christmas? From Annie's Angels. The treats purchased by staff for elders through the Buddy Enrichment Program? You guessed it—those "Buddy Bucks" are compliments of Annie's Angels.

"St. Ann's wonderful social workers know people's circumstances and what they need," says Dolly. "The Fund provides the money to make it happen."

That support is more crucial than ever in these times of COVID. To help ease the burden of isolation the Angels provided funds to support the addition of a greenhouse on the patio at Lily's Bistro where family members visiting elders through window visits can remain warm and comfortable during the cold weather.

"As hard as the pandemic has made things for the rest of us, it's even worse for the elders," says Dolly. "It's hard to see them unable to visit with their families. We worked with St. Ann's Foundation to do something to make that possible."

And as in tune as the Angels are with life at St. Ann's, the current campaign



For All They've Given was also on their radar. The Angels provided funds to support the Campaign and in turn, the new kitchens on each floor have been named Annie's Kitchen in recognition of St. Ann's Angels.

"The Angels have always been there for our elders, so it was important for us to recognize them in the renovated building. We are excited to have Annie's Kitchen on each of the new floors," says Michael E. McRae, President & CEO of St. Ann's Community.

Compassionate Care Inspires Philanthropic Gift

Watching a loved one succumb to dementia is one of the hardest things anyone can go through. What makes it a little less troubling is when you trust the people caring for that loved one.

That was how Beverly Verbridge felt about the care her cousin Miriam received at St. Ann's.

"I got to know Mashell, the certified nursing assistant, who helped her in the morning quite well and had great respect and confidence in her," says Bev. "I felt that way about everyone I met at St. Ann's ... Jasmine and Vel, both were nurses at different times during Miriam's stay, Ann Pennell from social work, and everyone on the second floor. I didn't feel I had to be there every day, which would have been impossible. I relied on them to take care of her, and they did."

Miriam lived at St. Ann's for seven years. She passed away in June 2020 at age 88. The quality of the care she received meant so much to Bev that she and a small group of friends decided to make a substantial gift to

St. Ann's Foundation in recognition of that care.

"We were so pleased, it was just something we wanted to do," she says.

Two other couples joined Bev and her husband Gerald in making the gift: Miriam's cousin Les Cole and his wife Sandy, and friends Darrell and Esther Plyter.

Together, and with guidance from St. Ann's Foundation, they decided to split their gift among three areas: St. Ann's Capital Campaign *For All They've Given*, the Employee Scholarship Fund, and the Area of Greatest Need. *(Information on these and other giving options is available at stannscommunity.com/donate-now)*

As a Registered Nurse herself, Bev felt strongly about giving to the Employee Scholarship Fund in particular.

"I know many of the certified nursing assistants and others are working toward advanced degrees. I think that's great," she says. "So that's

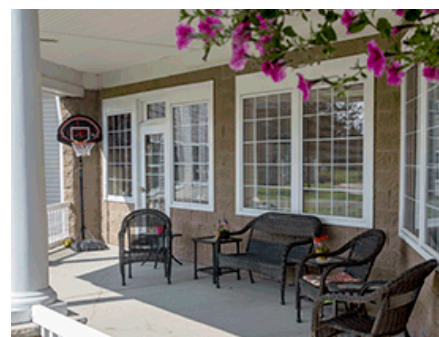

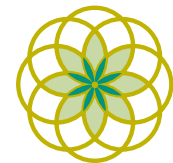
